Superintendent: We're excited to welcome every student to the 2022-23 school year

I would like to welcome all our students, families, and community members to the 2022-23 school year! The staff of Community Consolidated School District 89 is so excited to begin this next adventure in learning together.

After three irregular school years, it feels good to be starting school with a more normal routine. If you don't have students in CCSD 89, you

might not realize that by the end of the last school year, most of the school day had gotten back to a pre-pandemic 'normal': extracurricular activities resumed, visitors returned to the schools, and all of our students were learning in the buildings.

We ended the year by celebrating 216 Glen Crest Spartans who are now high school freshmen. I hope that the entire community feels the Superintendent pride of knowing that each of

you contributed to the educational foundation that will support their very bright futures.

Within days of that promotion ceremony, the district began our busy summer. About 320 students participated in our summer school program. This is the second year the district has offered an expanded summer school that targets students' individual learning needs and addresses any learning loss due to the pandemic. Additionally, dozens of CCSD 89 students participated in the Glen Ellyn Children's Resource Center (GECRC) summer program. Thanks to GECRC, the students were able to explore learning opportunities that went beyond what is traditionally offered in our schools, such as meeting a plant doctor at the Morton Arbore-

Construction will begin in summer of 2023 after community approves school-bond referendum

The next two summers will be filled with construction work at Community Consolidated School District 89 schools after residents approved the bond referendum. On June 28, more than 71 percent of voters supported the district's bond referendum.

This result means the district will be able to complete essential health, safety, and accessibility projects at all five CCSD 89 schools while lowering residents' tax rate.

Among the highlights of the work will be:

- Remodeling the Arbor View and Briar Glen elementary school and Glen Crest Middle School entrances for additional security;
- Replacing the elevator lifts at Arbor View and Glen Crest;
- Replacing Arbor View, Briar Glen and Glen Crest roofs, which were all past their expected lifespan;
- Replacing all or parts of the heating and air conditioning systems at all five schools;
- Remodeling kitchens at the elementary schools to improve food service for students;
- Replacing all or part of deteriorating parking lots at all five schools;
- Boiler or water heater replacement at Arbor View, Briar Glen, and Glen Crest.

A full list of potential projects is at www.ccsd89.org/bondprojects The majority of the work will occur in the summer of 2023 and 2024. The district will continue to update the community on the progress of these projects.

Many of the systems that will now be replaced were coaxed well beyond their expected lifespan, thanks to the dedicated work of the CCSD 89 buildings and grounds team. The district will maintain this high level of attention to detail with the new systems so they also last as long as possible.

The district will also continue its traditions of meticulous maintenance and fiscal responsibility. Even with a successful referendum, the Board of Education was able to provide tax relief by allowing a 2008 set of bonds to retire and reducing a 2009 set of bonds. The Board will

continue to look for ways to reduce costs while still providing students with an excellent education.

Most importantly: this referendum means students will continue to go to school in a safe, accessible, temperaturecontrolled environment that allows them to focus on their learning.



Make a difference for a student by volunteering or donating to afterschool tutoring program

In July, 22 students visited the Morton Arboretum for a day of fun and learning. The visit started with a walk on platforms that brought the students to the top of the trees and inspired them to study nature from 100 feet up.

The students then explored a small pond where an ecologist showed them the unique plants and animals in this wet ecosystem. Finally, the students had a chance to meet with a plant pathologist who described the similarities and differences between doctors who work with people and those - like her -

who work with plants.

All these diverse summer learning opportunities were made possible by CCSD 89's partnership with the Glen Ellyn Children's Resource Center (GECRC). During the school year, GECRC runs an afterschool mentoring program at Glen Crest Middle School for students who need additional academic support.

Two CCSD 89 employees design the daily activities for the afterschool program while community volunteers help students with classwork.

A similar GECRC program in District 41 has shown powerful results: With the support of trained staff and dedicated volunteers, students who consistently participated in the mentoring program showed significant academic acceleration.

Students in the specialized academic classroom at Glen Crest Middle School have cognitive or intellectual disabilities. Once a month, these students take trips into the community where they can apply their classroom learning to real-life situations and increase their independence.

"One thing that's really neat to see when we're out in the community is people will come up to us," said Rebecca Luedtke, Glen Crest speech and language pathologist. Expanded summer school helps students meet standards

About 320 students participated in CCSD 89's expanded summer school program in 2022. This is the second consecutive year that the district has significantly increased the size of its three-week summer school session.

In total, more than 600 students participated in the 2021 and 2022 summer school.

CCSD 89 summer school was designed for students who needed additional time to meet learning standards from the

previous school year. The classes helped students sharpen their skills and continue their academic growth.

The classes were taught by CCSD 89 teachers and were free for CCSD 89

The expanded program was paid for by the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Fund, federal grants that were provided to school districts to address the impact of the pandemic on student learning.

Save a life! Residents invited to donate blood Aug. 24 at Glen Crest

With more local permanent blood centers closing, Glen Crest Middle School has become a regular host site for blood drives organized by Versiti Blood Centers. Everyone in the community is invited to donate blood at Glen Crest.

Glen Crest will host its next blood drive from 2 to 6:30 p.m. on Wednesday, August 24. Appointments will be honored first.

Blood donation is a simple four-step process: registration, medical history, donation, and refreshments. Blood donation usually takes about 10 to 12 minutes. The entire process, from arrival to exit, takes about an hour.

Versiti Blood Centers provide blood to hospitals across the country. The lives of approximately 4.5 million Americans are saved each year by blood transfusions. After the August 24 event, Glen Crest will next host a blood drive on November 2.
