In 2023-24. Northwestern's Center for Talent Development began a comprehensive review of our gifted and advanced learning supports across the district. The results were presented at our June board meeting and we plan on starting to work on those recommendations

during this school year, starting with defining our purpose.

We also deepened our partnership with the staff at Glenbard South High School so that our students can have the best possible transition to secondary education.

Finally, this was the second consecutive summer of major summer construction at our schools. I would like to thank our community for their patience with the work.

This summer, we were able to complete major work at all five schools, including lighting, and heating and air conditioning work at Briar Glen; new parking lots at Arbor View and Glen Crest; and a new kitchen at Glen Crest. (see page 2 for more information) Because of your support, our students will learn in buildings that are safer, healthier, and more energy-efficient.

These are some of the "big" projects we tackled last year but I don't want to lose sight of the sometimes-unnoticed victories we see every day: The girl who read her first chapter book; the student tried out for a new sports team or joined a new club; the boy who played the violin for the first time.

These are the sorts of 'small' accomplishments that are life-changing for the student who makes a discovery about their potential. Every member of this community is a part of making those pivotal moments possible.

As we look ahead to this year, our staff will be having discussions about ways to further reduce bullying and develop empathy. We will also be looking at ways to decrease the distractions associated with smart devices.

Our focus for the year will center on "being intentional" with our work. I will challenge the staff to break out of routines and ask: how can we take intentional steps to make the learning environment the best it can be for each student, each day?

I hope this is something that you can discuss in your home as well. How are your students making intentional choices with their learning and social-emotional development?

As we return to school, it is a time of joy and inspiration. I can't thank you enough for all do to support students and each other. Please join us for a great school year!

CCSD 89 summer construction schedule – 2024 update

In June of 2022, more than 71 percent of the voters supported a school district proposal to complete essential health, safety, and accessibility projects in CCSD 89 schools. Significant construction was completed in the summer of 2023.

Crews will begin 2024 work on the last day of the school year. This is a summary of major projects at each school.

Many families can track student bus travel with app

Many CCSD 89 families will be able to track their student's bus trips to and from school through a free busing app.

Parents can download the FirstView app. The app can show an estimated number of minutes until the bus arrives at a bus stop, and when a bus arrives at school. Families can also set the app to send out customized alerts when the bus is a certain distance or number of minutes away from their child's bus stop.



The app only works for students riding First Student buses. It is not available for special education (Hopewell) transportation, early or late buses, or student field trips.

Before- and after-school care for elementary students

CCSD 89 partners with organizations to provide before- and afterschool programs for elementary school students. The Butterfield Park District (RecKids) and the B.R. Ryall YMCA (Safe 'n Sound) both run programs in CCSD 89 schools. More information on both programs is at www.ccsd89.org/beforeafter

Registration for 2025-26: preschool expected to open in January, kindergarten in February

Families interested in having their student attend tuition preschool in the 2025-26 school year will begin registration in January 2025. Families will need to provide an original birth certificate and proof of residency to be placed in a lottery for preschool openings. Families not selected in the lottery are put on a waitlist.

Registration for kindergarten students who will be new to the district in the 2025-26 school year is expected to open in February 2025. All new students will also have to provide an original birth certificate and prove residency.



More information about registration will be posted on the district's website (www.ccsd89.org) in December.

Registration for returning students is expected to open in April 2025.

Board will consider e-learning option for emergency days

CCSD 89 could have more options for how to continue learning when extreme weather keeps buildings closed. At 7 p.m. on August 19, the Board of Education will hold a public hearing to review and adopt an e-learning program for the 2024-27 school years. If approved, the e-learning plan will give the district the option to use e-learning (online learning) in place of in-person learning on emergency days.

About e-learning

If the Board supports the district applying for an e-learning certificate, it would give CCSD 89 the option to hold classes online when the schools are closed due to an emergency. It would not mandate the use of e-learning.

When extreme weather is anticipated, the superintendent would consider several factors to determine if schools should be open, closed, or e-learning. E-learning days would apply to all of the district or none of the district -- not for individual students. E-learning can help families manage the school-year calendar while still providing consistent educational opportunities to students.

In a survey taken in February, 68 percent of parents and 76 percent of staff supported the district having an e-learning option in place. The final plan was developed with input from CCSD 89 staff.

If the Board approves the three-year e-learning plan, it will be in place during the 2024-25 school year.

The district will send out a notice if the schools are closed. If there is no notice posted, schools are open on a regular schedule. In an emergency, you will be contacted at the phone number and email address on file with the school, so it is important that the school has current contact information.
